 - Moral Conversion means being responsible to cultivate habits that embody the moral virtues one has embraced and to live according to a broader social responsibility.
 - Religious Conversion* begins by making a vow of devotion to Jesus and confessing Jesus' right to have authority over every aspect of my life.

Introduction

- Conversion is often gradual
- Conversion necessitates community

-Have we embraced an American dream at the expense of displacing and supplanting a superior Biblical narrative?

Abraham

-Genesis 12:1-3

-American Dream: "The ideal by which equality of opportunity is available to any American, allowing the highest aspirations and goals to be achieved."

-Emma Lazarus 1883 poem The New Colossus (Statue of Liberty)

Not like the brazen giant of Greek fame,
With conquering limbs astride from land to land;

Breakdown & Breakthrough

-Moses in Pharaoh's House

-"Conversions often follow a pattern popularly referred to as breakdown/breakthrough. A breakdown occurs when the habitual way of interpreting events or behaving can no longer adequately account for certain experiences or feelings. When someone in breakdown decides to take responsibility for resolving the issue, a breakthrough occurs. A breakthrough opens a new way of looking at the universe; it gives one new eyes and ears."

-Matthew 5:21, 27, 31, 33, 38, 43

-"You have heard that it was said...but I say to you."

-Has an American cultural attitude created a filter over Scripture?

-Do we see the Great Commission as serving or winning?
-Are we mistaking Christ's authority over us for our authority over others?

-My complaint with this pastor's perspective is that he is representing his viewpoint as being motivated by helping others. When in reality he is saying that what others need is more of what benefits him...he needs a breakdown and a breakthrough!

The Last Supper

-(describe setting)

-John 13:1-5

>when we understand who we come from and where we are going after this life, we are no longer afraid to serve others. We don't feel such a driving need to compete with others...our identity and security comes from knowing God created us and that Heaven waits for us.

-John 13:6-11 (why He washes our feet)

>Jesus saying "your feet only" is His way of warning against Universalism. Jesus is telling us His death will cleanse us of our sin BUT we must come to Him. Salvation is still by grace. But that grace is not appropriated until I come to Him with a vow of my devotion.

-John 13:12-15 (why we wash the feet of others)

>We are commanded to wash each other's feet because someone who has been saved should always be someone who now serves. This command by Jesus was because He knows that human nature always drifts toward rugged individualism.

Band

-We are in love with Communion because Jesus is easy to love, and we easily celebrate what we gain from His death. We neglect washing the feet of others because people are often unlovable, and we don't easily celebrate putting the needs of others ahead of our own.

Close

-But Fred, if I see society and politics dramatically different from someone else, how can I be friends with them? How can I be in the same church with them? Whenever we feel that way, ask yourself what Jesus was thinking when He invited both a tax collector and a zealot to be two of the 12? They embraced a covenant over a dream!
